PRE-LAB ASSIGNMENT

Frosh, it's getting close to the beginning of the school year and you should be preparing for yourself for your first year as a Queen's Engineer. Since we don't want to confuse your limited minds (yet) here are a few facts that will help to insure that you have a good start at Queen's. PAY ATTENTION FROSH OR YOU WILL BE SORRY!!!!

- 8) The AMS runs a telephone hotline throughout Orientation Week from 7am to 2am each day. This service is there for your benefit, Frosh, so make use of it if you need it. Call (547-5835 or 547-5836)
- 9) This is the real world, Frosh, and things cost money. You're going to have to pay for beer, transportation, dances, and whatever things you need for your room. Have some spare bucks available, at least \$100.00 above your Frosh Week fee to get you through the week.

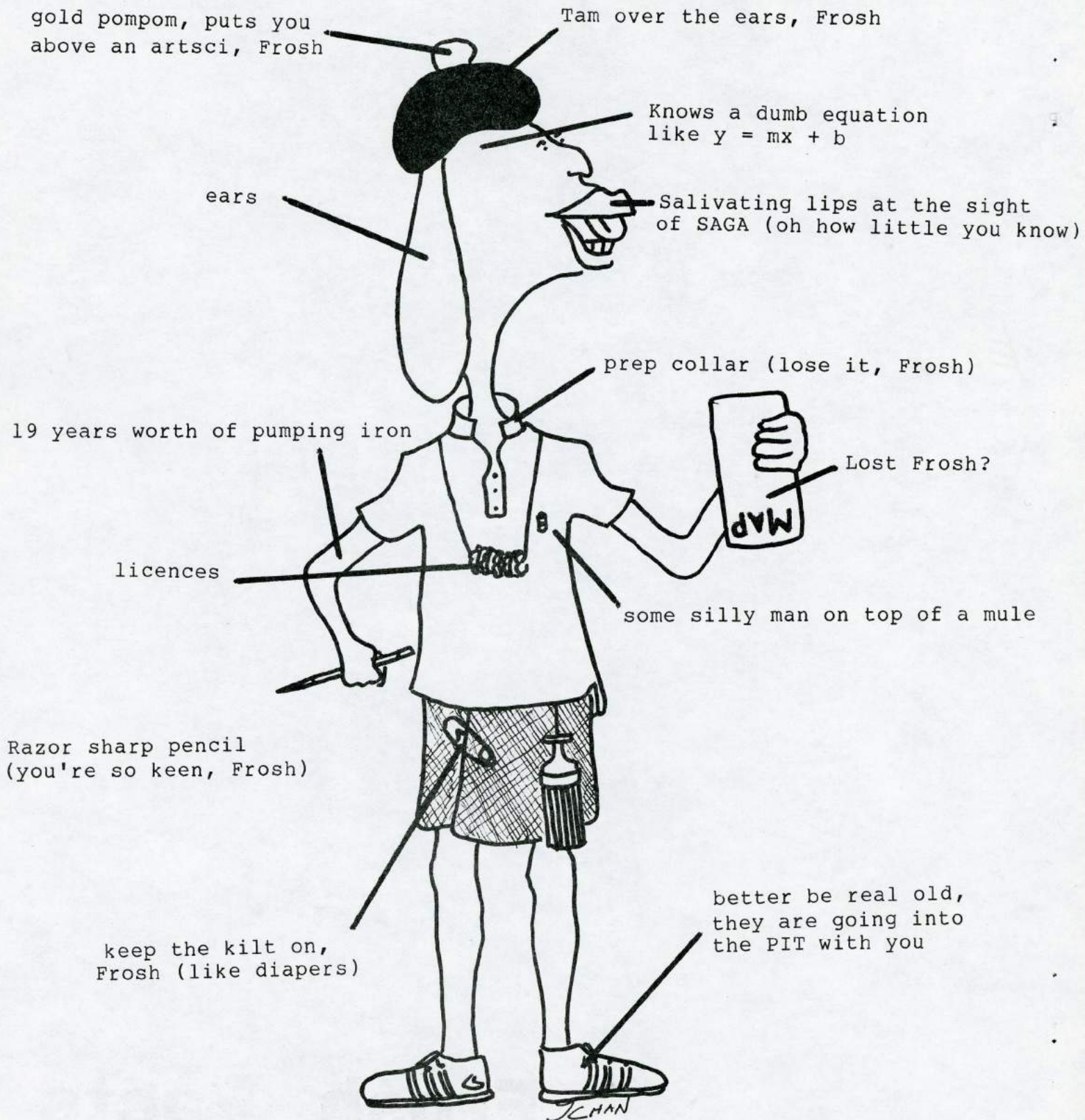

FUNDAMENTAL THEOREM OF FROSH WEEK

Queen's University is a self-regulating community bound together by the common interest of its members each of whom shares a personal responsibility for its welfare. By virtue of the University's location, a Queen's student is also a citizen of the City of Kingston and as such, is expected to respect the rights and promote the well-being of his or her fellow citizens. Registration signifies becoming an accountable member of the University community, a process conferring not only rights and privileges but the obligation to conduct oneself in a manner which will not reflect adversely upon Queen's University.

All students are required to adhere to the University's code of conduct. They should also bear in mind that compliance with this code implies non-participation in disturbances which have been formally prohibited by the Senate, adherence to the laws governing the possession and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages and generally, maintaining the reputation of the University. Initial responsibility for the enforcement of the code rests with the Alma Mater Society, Inc. and the Graduate Student Society on behalf of the Senate.

In general terms, acceptable conduct does not infringe on the rights of other members of the university community, and conforms to the regulations of the university and its subordinate jurisdictions and to the system of non-academic discipline should not be regarded as a substitute for the criminal or civil law, but rather as a complementary system that may be derived naturally from our existence as a clearly distinguishable community of interest. The following conduct is unacceptable and constitutes an offence within the university community:

- a) a violation of published rules and regulations of the University or of any authorized rule-making body within the university.
- b) failure to comply with the directions of officials of the university acting within the scope of their authority.
- c) assault, sexual harassment(*), theft or other forms of intimidation, vandalism, and wilful or negligent damage to the property of Queen's or a member of the University community, of the AMS, or any other University organization.
- d) all forms of academic dishonesty such as plagiarism, cheating, furnishing false information to the university, forgery, misuse of university documents.
- e) a violation of the rights of any member of the university community.

Queen's has a University Chaplain, provided by the University and several other chaplains, provided by their denominations. These chaplains are here to help students in any way they can, from deeply spiritual or personal problems to the very practical aspects of living in and adjusting to university life.

The chaplains are very aware that each year a number of new students find Orientation Week overwhelming or excessive. Students are encouraged to exercise their own judgement as to the extent to which they participate and are reminded that all activities are voluntary. You can use it just as a chance to meet the Chaplains, or as a place to report or discuss a complaint against any aspect of Orientation Week.

JUST A SERIOUS NOTE

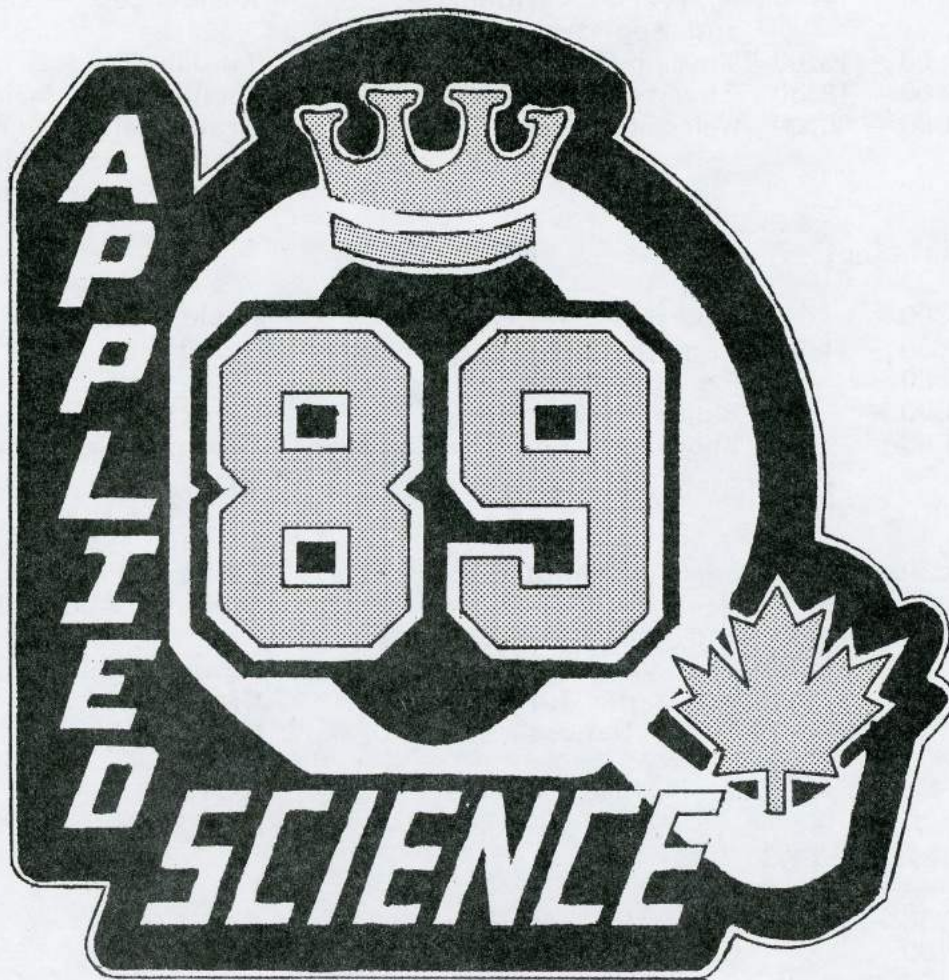
You may be wondering where your Frosh Week Fee goes during the week.

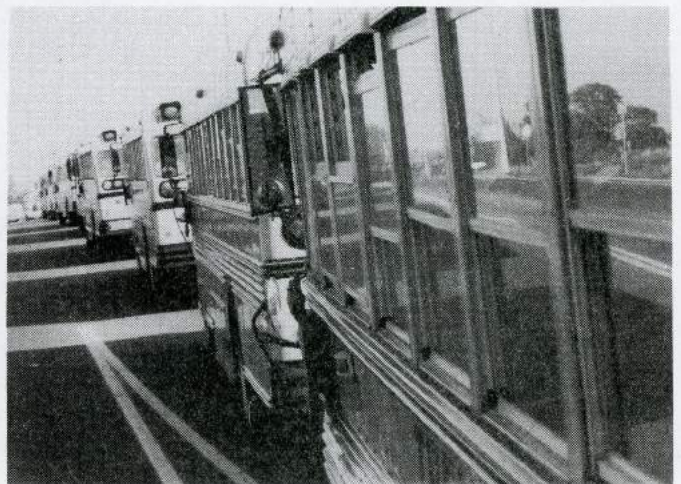

ENGINEERING JACKETS

One of the oldest traditions at Queen's is for the students to show pride in their school and their faculty be wearing a queen's leather jacket. Each faculty has it's own jacket colour, the engineering jackets are of course GOLD (not yellow Frosh). As soon as you arrive you'll see that they are the best ones on campus because they distinguish Engineers from other inferior lifeforms (i.e. Artscis and Commies).

Construction of the formal starts early in September. The only way the extravaganza can be completed in time is with the help and co-operation of ALL Engineers (yes, that includes YOU, Frosh!). It is expected that all the Frosh put in at least one evening's work, helping to build the scenery for the '87's special evening.

The theme of this years formal is Khanibaligh, and depicts the adventures of Marco Polo on his journey from Venice to the lands of the great Kubla Khan. So make sure you come out and help create the palaces of Khanbaligh and Xanadu, the sacred river Alph, Mount Ararata, Magi's tombs. At the same time "drink the milk of Paradise" and maybe some subsidized ale too.

YEAR ELECTIONS

When (well, if...) you have been officially declared a science year at the greasepit, your year will need some representation and organization. It is very important to have a strong year executive to keep the year's spirit alive. You should start considering to run for a position on the executive. Start thinking about it soon, because elections are held soon after your Frosh Banquet.

There are many other things to see and do at Queen's outside of classes. So, Frosh, for your own good, get involved. As you will soon find out, that is what Queen's is all about.



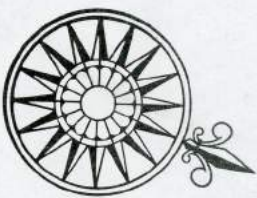

So, Gaels, go in and win!

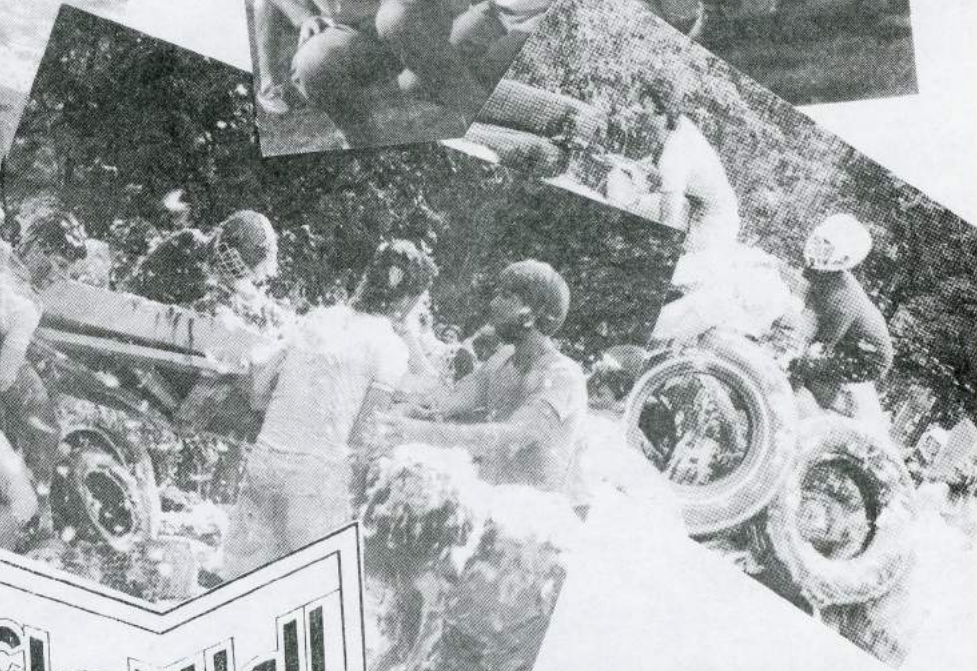

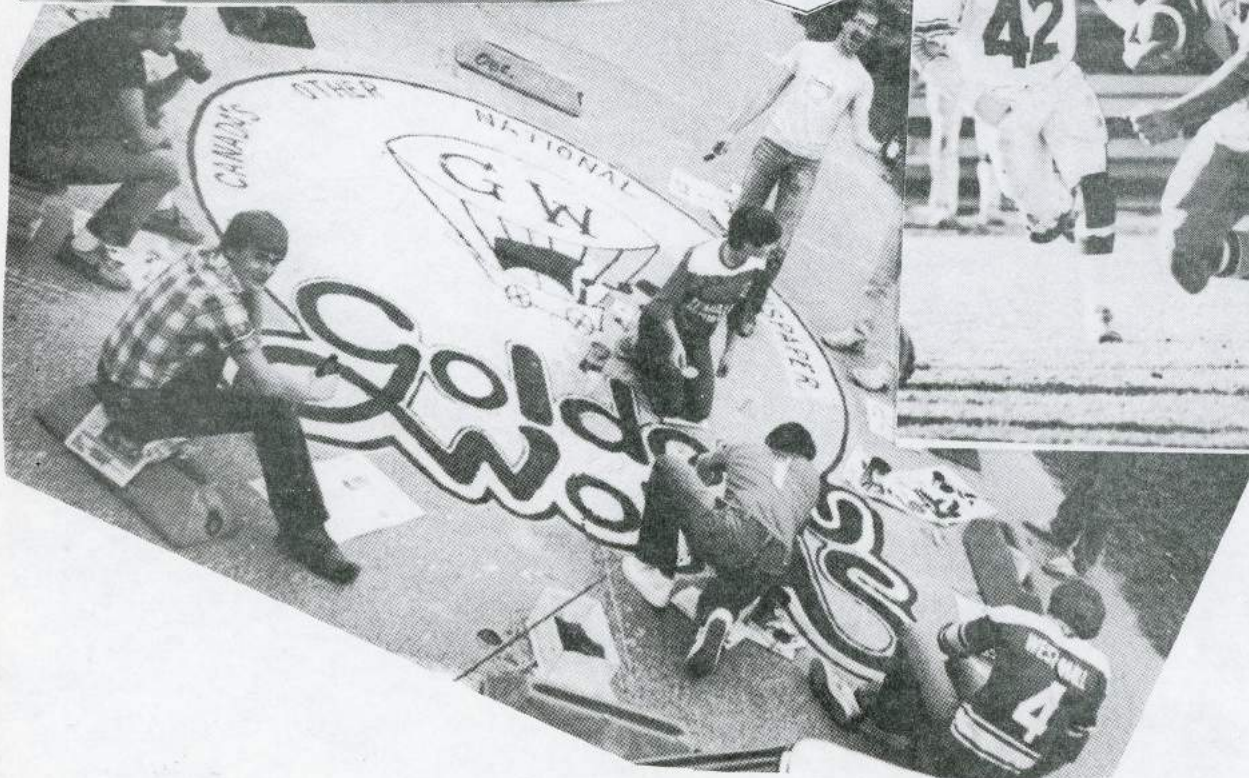

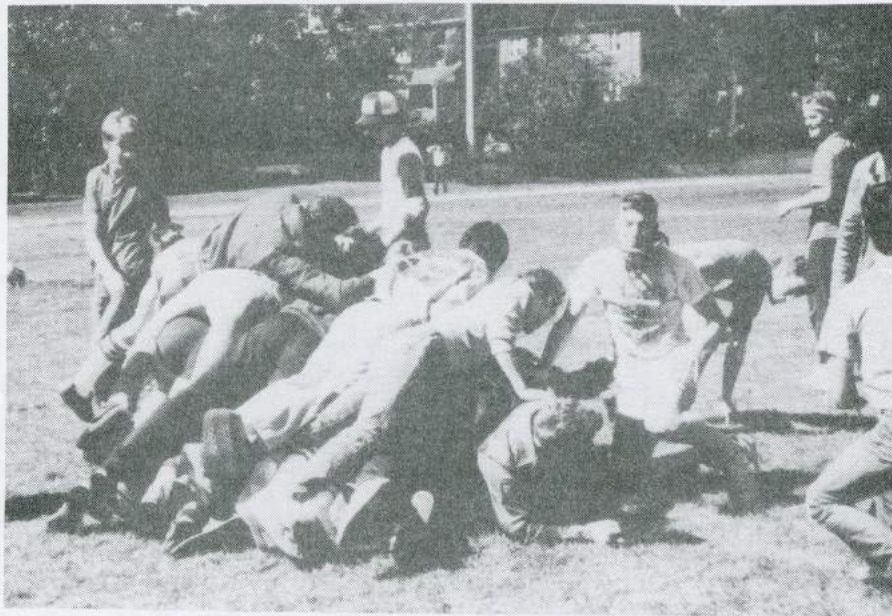
Dear Frosh,

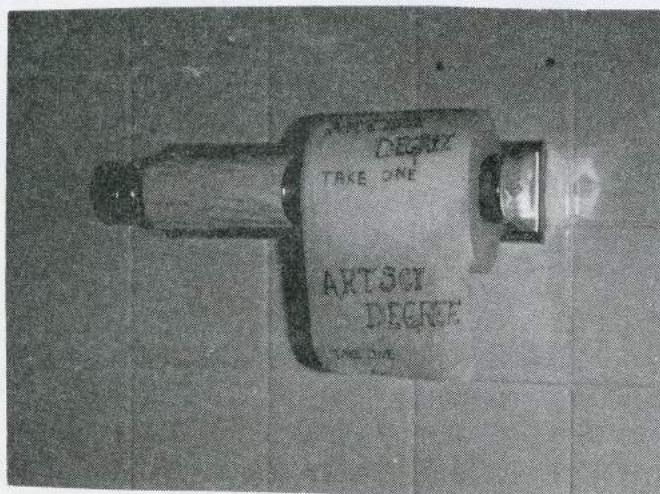
- artsci - (pronounced artsie) has a 3 beer-cap limit
