THE TRAINING OF SCOUT OFFICERS.

SECTION 1.

COURSE OF TRAINING FOR THE WOOD BADGE.

Open to all Warranted Officers of the Boy Scouts Association.

- 1. THEORETICAL—AIMS AND METHODS OF THE SCOUT TRAINING as defined in "Aids to Scoutmastership," "Scouting for Boys," and "Rules" in such subjects as Organisation according to ages; Four lines of training; Nature lure for soul health and sex knowledge; National need and possibilities of the training. (Section 2).
- 2. PRACTICAL-In four groups of subjects :--

The training will be at the Scout Officers Training Centre, Gillwell Park, or at a "Recognised" Scout Officers Training Camp, in four week-end courses or eight days in camp, as most convenient to candidate. (Section 3.)

3. ADMINISTRATION—The fulfilment of the duties attached to his Rank to the satisfaction of the Candidate's Commissioner. (Section 4.)

 - (b) Have an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the CHIEF SCOUT.

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SECTION 4.

Part 3.—ADMINISTRATION.

When a Candidate has passed Parts 1 and 2, he should apply for a Certificate from his Commissioner to the effect that he is qualified under this heading.

When considering such applications, Commissioners should bear in mind, amongst others, the following points :---

- 1. Due appreciation on the part of the Candidate of the importance of the Scout Spirit, gauged by the extent to which he appears to put it into practice, specially as regards Loyalty not only "to God and the King," but also to general principles of the Boy Scouts Association and the system of training laid down in "Scouting for Boys."
- 2. (a) In the case of a Commissioner :---

Ability to organise and administer an area, judged by the proportion of Scouts to the male population of Scout age (having regard to any special local conditions), and general state of organisation as disclosed in Annual Report for the area.

(b) In the case of a Scoutmaster :--

Ability to carry on a Troop on the lines laid down in "Scouting for Boys," judged by the performance of the Candidate's Troop, especially in camp.

(c) In the case of other Warranted Officers :--

The satisfactory fulfilment of the duties attached to his Rank.

ISSUE OF THE BADGE.

When a Candidate has obtained Certificates for Parts 1, 2 & 3, he should forward them to:—

when he will in return receive the Wood Badge. (See Section 8.)

SECTION 6.

APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTY CAMP CHIEFS.

When a Scout Officer has completed the course for the Wood Badge with distinction, and has shown himself specially qualified to instruct others, provided he has passed in Part 2 at the Scout Officers Training Centre, he may be nominated for appointment as a Deputy Camp Chief. The nomination will be made by the Commissioner for Training of Officers on the recommendations of the County Commissioner and the Camp Chief, Scout Officers Training Centre.

He will receive authority from the Chief Scout to act as a Deputy Camp Chief, together with an additional "BEAD." (See Section 8.)

The appointment may be withdrawn at any time, if circumstances so demand.

RECOGNITION OF SCOUT OFFICERS TRAINING CAMPS.

The following to be the conditions of recognition :--

- 1. The Camp must be run under the supervision of a Deputy Camp Chief, with the approval of the County Commissioner
- 2. A scheme of training for the ensuing year, ending 31st December, must be submitted each year to the Headquarters Commissioner for Training of Officers, through the County Commissioner, showing syllabus of training, places, and dates of courses.
- 3. Recognition may be withdrawn at any time by the Commissioner for Training of Officers.
- 4. In addition to County control, Training Camps may be visited from time to time by the Commissioner for the Training of Officers, and such Officers as he may appoint for the purpose.

SECTION 8.

THE WOOD BADGE.

The Badge will be a facsimile of one of the "BEADS" forming the necklace originally belonging to the Chief "Dinizulu," which was captured by the Chief Scout himself during the Zulu War. It will be worn strung on a leather bootlace round the neck.

The Badge for a Deputy Camp Chief will be same as above, with the addition of an original "BEAD" from the necklace.

SECTION 9.

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Dates of the Practical Course at the Scout Officers Training Centre, Gillwell Park, during 1920.

SECTION 10.

DETAILS FOR CANDIDATES DESIRING TO ATTEND the Scout Officers Training Courses,

at Gillwell Park.

- 1. All Warranted Scout Officers are eligible, as well as University Undergraduates.
- 2. As the Chief Scout wishes to see approved S.M. Training Camps started through the Empire as soon as possible, preference will be given to those who wish to qualify as Deputy Camp Chiefs.
- 3. The Course of Instruction will be based on SCOUTING FOR BOYS, and the Chief Scout's book "AIDS TO SCOUTMASTER-SHIP," and will include lectures and practical work in campcraft, nature study, general scouting, organisation and methods of running patrols and troops (see syllabus Section 3).

4. FULL COURSES.

(a) ASSEMBLY.

Candidates will book to Chingford Station, and should endeavour to leave Liverpool Street by the 5.32 p.m. train on the first day (Monday). A brake will meet this train to convey kits, &c., to Gillwell Park.

(b) DISPERSAL.

The Course ends in time for candidates to leave Chingford Station at 10.35 a.m. on the tenth day (Wednesday week).

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- (c) It is necessary to attend every day of the Course to qualify.
- 5. WEEK-END COURSES.
 - (a) ASSEMBLY.

The same as for Full Courses, arriving on the Friday.

(b) DISPERSAL.

The Course ends in time for the candidates to leave Chingford Station at 6.33 p.m. on the Sunday.

- 6. Those attending the Course should wear correct Scout kit; shorts and not breeches should be worn, except for medical reasons.
- 7. The following articles must be brought :--
 - (a) "SCOUTING FOR BOYS" & "AIDS TO SCOUTMASTER SHIP," which should have been read beforehand.
 - (b) Notebook and sketchbook.
 - (c) Blankets, clothing and personal equipment as given in "SCOUTING FOR BOYS," pages 109-110.

- 8. Courses will be carried out in camp. Tents, ground sheets. and cooking utensils will be provided.
- 9. All food supplies can be obtained on the spot. The catering and cooking is carried out under Patrol arrangements.
- 10. There are no expenses other than the cost of food.
- 11. Applications to attend should be made to :--

SECTION 11.

METHOD OF TRAINING AT THE SCOUT OFFICERS TRAINING CENTRE, GILLWELL PARK.

1. ORGANISATION OF THE COURSE.—Scoutmasters sink their identity and become *plain* Scouts, split up into three patrols. Each Scout takes a day's turn at being a Patrol Leader. Thus, yesterday's "Second" becomes to-day's Patrol Leader, and to-morrow goes to the bottom of the Patrol. The Course is run as a Troop of Scouts.

2. SYSTEM OF INSTRUCTION.

- (b) When there is a WRONG as well as a RIGHT way of doing a thing, both ways are shown.
- (c) Each candidate is required to show his ability at instructing, by lecturing to the whole Troop from time to time, on the "5 minute" lecture principle.
- (d) The competitive spirit is encouraged by emphasising COMPARISONS between each Patrol, with regard to their respective Scouting abilities, camp cleanliness and good order of tents and surrounding ground.
